Project Overview

The Compassion Corridor is a multi-year visionary environmental art and community engagement initiative designed to connect the cities of Clarkston and Scottdale through creativity, compassion, and ecological stewardship. Led by Compassionate Atlanta, in partnership with career artist and eco-activist Shannon Willow, the Compassion Corridor builds upon the success of the *Heart of Mother Earth* installation to expand community awareness, education, and environmental care across DeKalb County.

Anchored by two monumental art installations — the *Heart of Mother Earth* and the proposed *Lungs of Mother Earth* — the @2-mile corridor will serve as a living symbol of our interconnection with nature and one another. Each site will be supported by pollinator meadows, community art, and public education designed to inspire Earth stewardship, well-being, and a deeper sense of shared humanity.

Background and Inspiration

Through a national grant from the Mediators Foundation, artist Shannon Willow designed and created the *Heart of Mother Earth*, an eight-foot-tall, 400-pound anatomical-shaped heart sculpture now thriving at Trailside Green Pocket Park in Clarkston. Surrounded by a pollinator meadow, the installation has become a living classroom — sparking curiosity, reflection, and environmental awareness among passersby on the Stone Mountain Trail of the Path Metro Atlanta Bike Path.

The *Heart of Mother Earth* is maintained by lead artist and Master Naturalist, Shannon Willow, DeKalb Master Gardeners volunteers, and Green Box Homes, in partnership with the City of

Clarkston. The site remains pesticide and herbicide-free and continues to evolve as a community-centered Earth education space.

Building on this momentum, Compassionate Atlanta, in collaboration with Shannon Willow and Commissioner Ted Terry, together envision the creation of the *Lungs of Mother Earth* — a companion installation that expands the concept of living art and connects Clarkston to Scottdale along a “Compassion Corridor.”

Project Description: Lungs of Mother Earth

The *Lungs of Mother Earth* will mirror the heart’s anatomical and material design, using a combination of steel, wood, and living moss. This living sculpture will be installed at the corner of Church Street and Proctor Avenue in Scottdale, directly along the Path Foundation’s Stone Mountain Trail, further activating the corridor through beauty, human connection, education, and ecological impact.

A 3,500-square-foot pollinator meadow filled with native, drought-tolerant plants will surround the sculpture. Using a no-till method like the *Heart of Mother Earth* installation, the meadow will improve soil health, promote biodiversity, and reduce maintenance costs. The project will be launched with a major community engagement day which will be a Community Planting Day, inviting residents to “sow the seeds of connection, awareness, and healing” together — literally and symbolically breathing life into the corridor.

The goal for the unveiling event of the *Lungs of Mother Earth* will be targeted for on or around Earth Day 2026.

Environmental Partner:

The Lead Artist’s Environmental Partner will be Green Box Homes, founded by Tres Crow. They will be responsible for the maintenance of the meadow during the project term. They specialize in regenerative landscaping which restores soil, boosts biodiversity, sequesters carbon, and fosters climate resilience.

Maintenance Regimen for the Meadow by Environmental Partner:

Reasoning: The goal is to develop a vibrant and diverse meadow that is capable of self-seeding which will continue to grow on its own, unencumbered, ensuring the long-term health of the meadow.

- Once the meadow is sown and planted, 2 trained Green Box growers will visit the site weekly for 1 hour to perform common maintenance tasks for the first 6 months.
- After the first 6 months and visits will taper off to bi-weekly for the next 3 months, or until the meadow is ready to be cut and reseeded in the Fall.
- Growers from Green Box Home will disperse additional seeds monthly to create a full meadow.
- Additional seeds will be disbursed and spent seed heads from the existing plants will also be disbursed to speed up adoption and crowd out unwanted and non-native plants.
- General maintenance includes weeding, watering, and pruning.
- Green Box Homes is a well-established environmental business. They are well equipped with appropriate machinery for the scale of this project and their fee includes the use of their equipment.
- Green Box Homes will purchase all plant, soil and seed materials needed for the meadow and their estimate of \$4,500 is all inclusive and will be paid directly by CA.

Supporting Art Installations

Two additional community-created art pieces will further animate the corridor and amplify its message of compassion and environmental health:

Peace Post Creation and Installation:

Created in collaboration with *Posts for Peace and Justice*, designed with local community input to promote peace, justice, and connection.

The *Compassion Corridor Peace Post* is a community art installation designed to bring DeKalb residents together to explore the value and priority of peace within the county. Through an interactive, facilitated workshop held in **Spring 2026**, after the installation of *Lungs of Mother Earth*, workshop participants will co-create words and imagery that express their collective vision of peace, compassion, and environmental care. These community-generated messages will be permanently incorporated into the Peace Post, ensuring that residents become true co-creators and stakeholders in this lasting public expression of unity and civic pride. The final installation—scheduled for **Summer 2026**—will reflect the voices of the community and highlight shared commitments to sustainability and Earth stewardship.

The location of the Peace Post will be determined collaboratively with county staff, residents, and the artist, and will comply with all zoning and ownership requirements. This project provides residents the opportunity to be part of both the discussion and the solution, modeling authentic civic engagement that helps neighborhoods thrive.

Budget: \$3,000 — inclusive of materials, workshop facilitation, and installation costs.

***No More Liddering* Creation and Installation:**

Led by artist Heather Elson, created from recycled plastic lids collected by Metro Atlanta volunteers. This art piece will engage residents in creative environmental action and highlight the Social Determinants of Health.

This art piece will transform recycled plastic lids collected by Metro Atlanta volunteers into a vibrant public art piece along the Compassion Corridor. Through **team building, community-based workshops** offered in **Spring 2026**, participants of all ages will learn about reducing single-use plastics, creative reuse, and the connection between environmental health and the **Social Determinants of Health**. This collaborative process empowers residents to take tangible action toward sustainability while beautifying shared public spaces and strengthening neighborhood bonds.

The installation, scheduled for **Summer 2026**, will be placed at a location determined in partnership with the planning team and county staff. This fully funded project providing an accessible and engaging opportunity for community members to experience environmental education, civic participation, and creative stewardship in one shared effort.

Budget: \$1,500 — inclusive of materials, workshop facilitation, and installation costs.

In future years, subject to additional funding, we envision more art installations to increase community engagement.

Timeline

Creating unique art can be a fluid process and estimated creation time can vary. All participants will make every effort to adhere to this generalized timeline. Specific dates are to be determined and will be determined based on the successful completion of the art project.

If there is a need for deviation from this timeline, it will be with the consensus of all parties with the intent to still meet all deliverables.

- **Project Timeline:** Fall 2025 to Fall 2026.
- **Start date:** Fall 2025 (upon funding)
- **Lungs of Mother Earth Art Installation:** On or around April 22, 2026, Earth Day.
(Estimate is 5 months to create. Based on The Heart of Mother Earth, 60 to 70 hours a week)
- **Workshops:** Facilitated seasonally by Shannon Willow.
 1. **Community Planting Day** – Spring 2026.
 2. **Spring into Action** – Spring 2026.
 3. **Get in Rhythm** – Fall 2026
 4. **Two additional workshops:** Dates and subject to be determined by main Artist and based on feedback from volunteers and community which will be held before Fall 2026.
- **Peace Post facilitated gathering:** Spring 2026.
- **Peace Post art installation:** Fall 2026.
- **No More Liddering facilitated gathering:** Summer 2026
- **No More Liddering art installation:** Fall 2026

Community Engagement and Education

Compassionate Atlanta will coordinate all artists, community partners, and communications to ensure a cohesive, inclusive experience. Engagement will include:

1. Earth Workshops led by Shannon Willow:

1. **Community Planting Day** – Preparing and planting the meadow together.
2. **Spring into Action** – Learning actionable steps for native planting and pollinator health.
3. **Get in Rhythm** – A drumming experience exploring harmony with Earth's natural rhythms, featuring Shannon Willow and Master Drummer Amy Jackson.

The *Earth Workshops*, led by main artist **Shannon Willow**, are designed to advance the goals of the Compassion Corridor by educating DeKalb residents on Earth care, sustainability, and the connection between personal well-being and environmental stewardship. Sessions will be held at the *Heart of Mother Earth*, the *Lungs of Mother Earth*, and various points along the

Compassion Corridor, as determined by the artist, allowing participants to engage directly with the living art installations. Workshops will begin in **Fall 2025** and continue through **Fall 2026**, with each session budgeted at **\$1,500** to cover facilitation, materials, and community engagement activities.

Volunteer and Maintenance Opportunities, also promoting environmental education — work with Shannon Willow and Green Box Homes to ensure ongoing stewardship and care for the spaces.

2. **Peace Post community conversation and facilitation** will connect residents across Clarkston, Scottdale and beyond to explore compassion, wellness, and sustainability. A cross-sector resident/BoC workshop to design and create the Peace Post will entail a discussion of the issues of concern and their solutions as envisioned by Dekalb County residents and BoC staff.
3. **No More Liddering community conversation** and Intergenerational workshop will allow for families, children and adults to gather and create a one-of-a-kind piece to repurpose recycling materials and discuss how we can all make a difference with our consumer choices.
4. **Compassionate Atlanta's Role:**
 - **Coordination:** Compassionate Atlanta will serve as the coordinating body for the Compassion Corridor, providing oversight and cohesion across all project components. Responsibilities include maintaining a master calendar, coordinating with artists and partners, communicating with county staff, managing accounting, and ensuring program alignment and accountability. Coordination will take place both **in person at each site** and through **virtual planning meetings** from **Fall 2025 through Fall 2026**.

This ongoing management ensures that all installations, workshops, and community engagement activities are executed seamlessly. Compassionate Atlanta will remain actively involved from the project's approval through the completion of all art installations and educational programs.

Fee: \$5,000 — based on an estimated **3.5 hours per week at \$30/hour for 48 weeks**, covering comprehensive project management to ensure a cohesive, well-coordinated, and successful implementation of the Compassion Corridor.

- **Social Media and Storytelling:** Compassionate Atlanta will lead and coordinate all storytelling and social media efforts for the Compassion Corridor, ensuring that every stage of the project is documented, celebrated, and shared through an educational and inspiring lens. Beginning with the creation of the pollinator meadow, the campaign will engage volunteers, artists, and residents in visioning and co-creating the living, breathing Compassion Corridor, continuing through the completion of the *Lungs of Mother Earth* and beyond.

Storytelling will be led by Compassionate Atlanta to educate, share environmental tips, and highlight community reflections. The storytelling component will capture the voices, experiences, and insights of community members, artists, and partners as they co-create this transformative project. Through shared stories—both visual and spoken—the campaign will deepen public understanding of how compassion, environmental care, and social connection weave together to build thriving, resilient communities.

A robust social media campaign will feature **educational reels, public stories, and short videos** documenting the creation and growth of the Corridor—from the *Heart* to the *Lungs of Mother Earth*—while highlighting local artists, volunteers, and community partners. Regular posts and digital flyers will promote workshops, planting days, and events, while also sharing **interactive opportunities** for residents to practice Earth stewardship at home, such as native planting, pollinator support, and waste reduction.

This ongoing campaign will be shared across **Compassionate Atlanta’s 14,000+ followers** and **Commissioner Terry’s platforms**, ensuring wide public visibility and engagement. All collaborating artists and partners will also cross-post using joint hashtags such as **#DeKalbCompassionCorridor**, building a unified digital story that connects online inspiration to real-world environmental action.

Budget: \$3,500 — includes storytelling coordination, digital content creation, social media promotion, and online community engagement.

- **Signage:** Compassionate Atlanta also be responsible for the installation of five permanent educational signs along the corridor. These signs will invite visitors to reflect on what it takes to design a thriving, compassionate community — exploring simple, accessible ideas around the social determinants of health, such as access to green

space, connection, safety, belonging, health access, economic mobility and environmental care. Tentatively, the signs are as follows:

1. Description of Lungs of Mother Earth art piece.
2. Information about the garden.
3. Calls to environmental action.
4. The relationship of compassion to the Heart of Mother Earth.
5. The relationship of compassion to the Lungs of Mother Earth.
6. Peace Post description.
7. No More Liddering description.
8. Names of participants in the project.

These eight permanent, high quality metal signs will accent the art piece and the 2 miles between both art installations.

Budget: The cost of these eight permanent signs is \$2,000 at \$250 each.

Alignment with Commissioner Ted Terry's Vision

The Compassion Corridor aligns deeply with Commissioner Terry's leadership in environmental sustainability, community wellbeing, and civic engagement. By converting underutilized land into thriving, pesticide-free green spaces, this initiative demonstrates how caring for our planet directly enhances the physical and mental health of residents. Small meadow patches can have outsized impacts — beautifying spaces, reducing county maintenance costs, and revitalizing ecosystems. Through art and collective care, the Compassion Corridor will model how compassionate action leads to healthier people and a healthier planet.

Role of Compassionate Atlanta

As the connective tissue of this initiative, Compassionate Atlanta will:

- Coordinate partners, artists, and community volunteers.
- Manage project communications and social media storytelling.
- Promote environmental and social compassion through online and in-person engagement.
- Evaluate impact through community participation and outreach metrics.

This collaborative structure ensures long-term sustainability and continued community ownership of each site.

- 3,500 sq. ft. native pollinator meadow established
- 4–6 community workshops engaging 300+ residents
- 50+ volunteers engaged in planting and maintenance
- 1,000+ residents reached through outreach and online storytelling
- 2 neighborhoods connected by compassion-driven green infrastructure

Conclusion

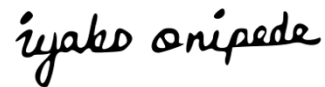
