## Relevance

More than fifty years after Dr. King talked about his dream for America's children, the stubborn fact is that the life chance of the average black or brown child in this country lags behind by almost every measure, and is worse for boys and young men. If you're African American, there's about a one in two chance you grow up without a father in your house—one in two. If you're Latino, you have about a one in four chance. We know that boys who grow up without a father are more likely to be poor, more likely to under-perform in school.

As a black student, you are far less likely than a white student to be able to read proficiently by the time you are in 4th grade. By the time you reach high school, you're far more likely to have been suspended or expelled. There's a higher chance you end up in the criminal justice system, and a far higher chance that you are the victim of a violent crime. Fewer young African-American and Latino men participate in the labor force compared to young white men. And all of this translates into higher unemployment rates and poverty rates as adults.

And the worst part is we've become numb to these statistics. We're not surprised by them. We take them as the norm. We just assume this is an inevitable part of American life, instead of the outrage that it is. That's how we think about it. It's like a cultural backdrop for us in movies and television. We just assume, of course, it's going to be like that. But these statistics should break our hearts and they should compel us to act!

# Mission

"As adolescents, young people that have been exposed to violence and trauma (including victimization experiences) are likely to manifest certain traits. They tend to have higher rates of learning disabilities. They have difficulties with problem solving and decision making."

DeKalb County's R.I.S.E. UP Leadership Development Program is designed to provide middle school aged young men residing in DeKalb County with weekly training, team building and networking activities. The R.I.S.E. UP Leadership Development Program will provide students with a community of support and network to prepare our young men to be leaders. The training curriculum is designed to meet the needs and interests of our young men. Trainers and presenters include Office of Youth Services staff, DeKalb County's elected officials and community partners.

### Program Overview

The R.I.S.E Up Leadership Program is designed to serve males students of color who are academically at-risk, as indicated by low school performance, behavioral problems, and absentee rates. This culturally enriched leadership and literacy program will educate, empower and equip these students to develop coping and resilient skills that will ultimately lead to overall success. The program will meet weekly beginning in the first quarter of 2019. The Office of Youth Services has identified two District 4 Middle Schools based upon the DeKalb County School District, Georgia Milestones ELA data: Freedom Middle School + Stone Mountain Middle School. It is recommended that one of the two middle schools be selected for program implementation.



#### Leadership Development

• To expose students to various leadership skills, opportunity, and challenges.

#### College & Career Readiness

• To promote and stimulate a desire for college and career readiness.

#### Social Awareness

• To inform students of the current emerging economic, social, political, communal and culture issues affecting people in America.

#### Networking

• To link R.I.S.E. young men with DeKalb County's local programs and special events.

#### Mental Health

• To nurture a network of positive youth by providing fertile opportunities for them to interact on various cultural settings.

#### Personal and Professional Decorum

• To develop Personal and Professional Decorum within our young men.

#### Economic Development

• To stimulate an appreciation for Business & Entrepreneurship.
